Experience It In Pasco County, outdoor escapes and adventures abound. Our Gulf Beaches, rivers and lakes offer fishing, canoeing, kayaking and scuba diving. More daring travelers may opt to see our beautiful area by skydiving. We have thousands of acres of pristine wilderness as well as eclectic small towns with unique histories to explore. You'll never feel crowded in Pasco County. The population is more than 471,709 (2009 estimate).



Location "It's Only Natural" Pasco County, the southern-most anchor of Florida's Nature Coast, sits just 30 minutes north of downtown Tampa and the beaches of Clearwater. Plus, Pasco County is just 90 minutes west of Orlando.

Natural Florida The landscape in Pasco presents a unique blend of plants and animals. Views include shady, slow-moving rivers, natural springs, a winding pristine Gulf shoreline and moss-draped oaks. In Pasco, visitors can enjoy the shade or the sun – we have both.

Climate The average temperature of Florida's Gulf Coast is 72 degrees – the perfect temperature for outdoor fun. Summer temperatures average 85 degrees and winter temperatures average 67 degrees.

Accommodations From a world class resort and quaint bed and breakfasts to economy lodges and corporate hotels, Pasco has many places to rest and revitalize. There are more than 24 hotel properties with 50-plus rooms.

Meeting Facilities Pasco can accommodate your meeting needs, large or small, indoors or outdoors. Our county offers more than 100,000 square feet of meeting space, the majority of it located at the Saddlebrook Resort, right off I-75 in Wesley Chapel.

Eateries An abundance of unique eateries are ready to serve you in Pasco County. Enjoy fresh-from-the-Gulf seafood specialties from Pasco's West Coast in New Port Richey, or visit Dade City's charming cafes on the eastern side of the county. Pubs, home style cooking and popular chain restaurants round out the list on Pasco's diverse menu.

Recreation & Sports Pasco County's 745 square miles contain more than 30 public parks that offer a variety of outdoor activities from canoeing and birding to fishing and diving. With more than 200 miles of mangrove and estuary shoreline and thousands of acres of pristine wilderness, Pasco's natural attraction is hard to resist. When it comes to sports, golfing and tennis are our specialties. Golfers enjoy playing on more than 20 public and private courses. Saddlebrook Resort in Wesley Chapel is home to two courses designed by golfing great, Arnold Palmer. Skydive City in Zephyrhills offers skydivers the chance to literally jump into the scenery and see a panoramic view of the whole area.

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History & Culture

Pasco's numerous historical properties and museums make terrific sightseeing excursions. In eastern Dade City, visit historic Main Street and the Pioneer Florida Museum & Village to get a glimpse of early Florida history. Or travel west to New Port Richey's West Pasco Historical Society Museum. Housed in a 1913 schoolhouse, exhibits include historical photos and documents, quilts, china, glassware and antiques. Slightly south in Elfers, see the Baker House, one of the oldest "crackerstyle" houses in the area, dating back to 1882.

Shopping

The Shops at Wiregrass is a main-street style, pedestrian-friendly, outdoor lifestyle village. The Shops at Wiregrass is Pasco County's newest Shopping destination, encompassing 800,000 square feet of retail, restaurants and entertainment on 67 acres of land. The mall features Macy's, Dillard's, JCPenney and 100 specialty retail stores and signature restaurants – in an eclectic tenant mix that combines fashion, home décor and entertainment venues shops.

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NEW PORT RICHEY'S GLAMOROUS PAST

EARLY STAGES Celebrities began flocking to New Port Richey in the roaring 1920s, when New Port Richey residents Mr. and Mrs. George Sims invited friends to visit from Great Neck, New York—a prominent movie and stage colony in the north. Sims Park, along the Pithlachascotee River on the edge of downtown, is named for this couple who introduced so many to the area and truly encouraged the city's growth.

STAR STRUCK Soon after the incorporation of the City of New Port Richey in 1924, Warren E. Burns of New York City began to develop his extensive holdings here. Lots were sold to silent screen idol Thomas Meighan, renowned comedian Ed Wynn, theatrical stars Raymond Hitchcock and his wife Flora Zabelle, movie stars Gloria Swanson and Leon Errol, jazz musician Paul Whiteman, and grand slam champion golfer Gene Sarazen. Meighan was among the first to build a home along the river. Today, boaters can view Meighan's gatehouse, Swanson's home, and Sarazen's riverside residence.

MEIGHAN THEATRE In September of 1925, the Richey Amusement Company built a new movie theatre downtown which was then named after Meighan. This elaborate brick building had a modified Moorish design, an ornate and colorful façade and columns imported from Italy. All 500 seats sold out in the Meighan Theatre upon its opening July 1, 1926, with the showing of "*The New Klondike*." This picture was about Florida's property boom and the star of the feature was none other than Meighan. Now named the Richey Suncoast Theatre, this historic building still stands, restored to its glorious splendor. Today the feature presentation is live stage productions instead of silent films.

HACIENDA HOTEL Completed in 1927, the 55-room Spanish-style Hacienda Hotel was designed to attract the movie industry to Florida. Opening night was like a Hollywood party with Ed Wynn serving as Master of Ceremonies. Meighan, Swanson and Sims were among partners in the hotel. For several years the hotel lived a colorful life, however, the hotel went bankrupt during the Great Depression. Since then, the hotel's condition has been on the decline. City officials are working with a development company and a site plan is underway to restore and expand the Hotel and enhance the destination for tourists.

END OF AN ERA While many expected New Port Richey to flourish as a movie and stage colony in the 1920s, the city never reached this destiny. The 1929 stock market crash and untimely death of Thomas Meighan in 1936 brought an end to such dreams.

SCENES TO REMEMBER The spotlight continues to shine on New Port Richey's glamorous past with scenes of the Meighan Theatre and the Hacienda Hotel on two murals located downtown. The wall paintings also feature residents and celebrities that frequented the area. Painted by local artist Tamara Gerkin and titled "Treasured Memories of New Port Richey," the first mural was dedicated in February 2005 by Mayor Dan Tipton, Deputy Mayor Ginny Miller, Councilman Tom Finn, Councilman Bob Langford, Councilman Matthew McCaffery and the Cultural Affairs Advisory Committee. Painted by Chad Leininger and titled "Dining and dancing at the Hacienda Hotel in the 1920s," the second mural was dedicated in June 2006. Some local residents of the community and celebrities depicted include: Greta Garbo, J. B. Starkey, Tim Holladay, Marsha Starkey, Des Little and Babe Ruth.

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These are not New Port Richey's last murals, and city officials hope to add more downtown. Antiques and Good Eats in Dade City

Tucked amid the lush rolling hills (yes, we said rolling hills!) of eastern Pasco County sits Dade City, the county seat. **Downtown Dade City** makes the perfect small town getaway with quaint restaurants and more than 50 antique shops, gift stores and chic boutiques all within walking distance of each other.

As Dade City visitors stroll through the historic town square, they will see numerous antiques in storefront windows and on the sidewalks. In 2004, *Florida Monthly* magazine recognized the area as one of the best antiquing destinations in the state. With brick roads and shops occupying early 20th-century buildings and surrounding the Historic Pasco County Courthouse, this downtown creates a great atmosphere for finding old treasures.

Dade City's eclectic lunch spots shouldn't be missed. At the popular **Lunch on Limoges**, mini-muffin appetizers are served on Limoges China and the menu changes daily. If dining on fine China is not your style, how about eating inside a transformed auto mechanics garage? At **Kafe Kokopelli** guests enjoy southwestern cuisine while sitting at tables made out of the Ford dealership's original garage doors.

Home to the **Annual Kumquat Festival** in January, Dade City and the neighboring town of St. Joseph produce the majority of kumquats in the southeastern U.S.—though they claim to be the “kumquat capital of the world!” Learn more about Florida's tiniest citrus by taking a **tour** through **Kumquat Growers, Inc.** Call 352-588-0544 to schedule it. 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GET WILD WITH GIRAFFE RANCH AND ZOOLOGICAL TOUR

DADE CITY, FL— Giraffe Ranch is located in beautiful east Pasco County 45 minutes north of Tampa. The eco-friendly tour is operated on 47 acres of rolling countryside. With huge live oaks, native orchid sand lush pastures and wetlands, the ranch is also a native wildlife preserve. Every night up to 200 sand hill cranes roost on the grounds. Experience the Giraffe Ranch farm tours with an experienced driver/guide in customized 4-WD safari tour vehicles. You will be safe, comfortable and get a terrific view, as each vehicle is fitted with shade canopies and stadium seating. You will learn about native and exotic animals and their habitats from your safari guide. You will see ongoing conservation efforts with endangered species and some that are extinct in the wild.

On safari you can feed giraffe, zebra and other animals from Asia, Africa, and the Americas. See a working herd of Austrian Haflinger horses and tiny Irish Dexter cattle. Giraffe Ranch has one of the largest herds of these diminutive cattle in Florida. Giraffe Ranch is not a zoo or theme park. It is a hands-on real working game farm and wildlife preserve where animals have room to roam. Family-owned and operated for over 10 years, Giraffe Ranch is open by reservation only. Giraffe Ranch operates two tours per day at 11 a.m. and 2 p.m. Tours are strictly limited in size and are fun, educational adventures. Giraffe Ranch is accredited by the Zoological Association of America (ZAA) and licensed by USDA.

Dade City's Wild Things is the latest attraction to boost Dade City as a unique tourist destination. The zoo is an outreach program of Stearns Zoological Rescue & Rehab Center Inc., a non-profit sanctuary zoo located on a 22-acre facility in the heart of Pasco County in historical Dade City, Florida.

"We pride ourselves on providing a natural botanical garden landscape environment for the animals in our facility," said Kathy Stearns, the zookeeper of more than 150 exotic animals. Big cats are walking the grounds like tigers, lions, jaguars, leopards, cougars and a Florida Panther. Plus, there are lemurs, bears, deer, porcupines, monkeys, exotic birds and a cute little river otter, who is quite an entertainer. The downtown Dade City Gift Shop features zoo-themed home décor, jewelry, photography and gifts for all ages. Visitors can relax and enjoy downtown Dade City or get a video preview of the exciting zoo. Then it's time to hop on an authentic trolley and experience an once-in-a-lifetime tour that brings visitors within four feet of the animals.

Attendees will be amazed at how close the tigers are stalking, bears playing, lions roaring, monkeys playing, otters swimming, birds calling, and much more. The combination of an excellent location (just minutes off I-75, 30 minutes from Tampa airport), engaging staff and sunny Florida weather have given Skydive City the reputation as one of the world's premiere drop zones.

Visitors have at their disposal a large viewing deck, high-quality student equipment, rigging service, food concessions, free camping, showers, laundry and a shuttle to major airports. The professional staff will make sure your jump is safe, and photography and video services will capture your experience forever.

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Bird Watching at its Best



Pasco County is home to more than 100,000 acres of public land to access and explore. These public areas consist of Pasco County parks, Florida state parks, the Southwest Florida Water Management District recreational lands, Florida State trails, state forestlands and private ranches. These diverse areas provide a wide range of natural habitats for a variety of birds. Salt marsh, mangrove, barrier island, oak scrub, pine flatwoods, cypress swamps, coastline, pasture and ranch land all encourage diversity of bird species. Historically, the area has yielded more than 325 species of birds.

Pasco County is a great birding destination because of its west central location; birds from both the north and south Florida areas can be observed. The broad-winged hawk, a more northerly species, and the short-tailed hawk, a more southern species, can both be found here. Rare birds, such as the western vagrants like the scissor-tailed flycatcher can be viewed here as well. The state identified Pasco's coastal areas as an important resting and feeding station for migratory birds because so much of the coastline to the south is developed. Pasco offers many modes of bird watching opportunities. Boating in the Gulf of Mexico, canoeing or kayaking the salt marshes and rivers, nature trails (for hiking, bicycling, and horseback riding), piers, observation towers and boardwalks are all available in Pasco County. The Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission created The Great Florida Birding Trail — a collection of sites throughout Florida selected for their excellent bird watching opportunities. Ten of these sites can be found right here in Pasco County. They are:

- **Withlacoochee River Park** — This county park features sand hill bluffs overlooking the Withlacoochee River, as well as a small wet prairie and some seasonal wetlands. This park offers amenities like picnic shelters and restrooms for family birding.
- **Green Swamp West** — This 37,000+ acre property safeguards the Green Swamp which gives rise to the Withlacoochee River, while providing excellent recreational access to upland pasture, sand hills and "Wildcat Swamp." A bike makes the size of this site more manageable.
- **Crews Lake Park** — This delightful little park offers a high tower overlook of Crews Lake, where overwintering waterfowl like sandpipers, ring-necked ducks and dunlin loaf and forage. Sedge wrens call from grassy margins and migratory songbirds like bobolinks exploit the edges between the wetland and oak hammock. According to the Great Florida Birding Trail, this is a "must-see."
- **Werner-Boyce Salt Springs State Park** — This vast park stretches nearly 3,500 acres along the Gulf of Mexico. A one mile scrub trail is currently open; a boardwalk is planned across a shady, freshwater slough, and trails will resume on the other side, leading all the way to the Gulf. This is a haven for paddlers who want to explore one of the best kept secrets of the nature Coast. Bring water and insect repellent. Monthly bird walks are available; call (727) 816-1890 for details.

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- **Robert K. Rees Park at Green Key** — This compact peninsular park is a birding gem, with clapper rails, reddish egrets and roseate spoonbills year-round; wintering shorebirds, marsh and sedge wrens; and a tendency for remarkable songbird landfall events in spring migration.

The entrance gate area can be excellent for hordes of spring migrants near dawn in April (bring insect repellent.) Gray kingbirds also breed here.

- **Jay B. Starkey Wilderness Park** — Behind the nature center, bird the boardwalk out across the floodplain forest to the Pithlachascotee River. The best birding by far is along the paved bike trail. A bike helps cover ground; listen for brown headed nuthatches and Bachman's sparrows as you pedal through flatwoods past occasional cypress domes. In nice weather, there are bird walks on the first Saturday each month. Loaner optics are available at the nature center.

- **James E. Grey Preserve and Pithlachascotee River** — This new 100-acre park includes a canoe launch and trail along the river with easy views of an eagle's nest. Hike the trail or paddle the river, which changes quickly from a wide waterway, to a winding stream over-arched with vegetation. Look for yellow crowned night herons and limpkins by the water; migrants like cedar waxwings in the canopy.

- **Key Vista Nature Park** — This small nature park provides hiking trails through sand pine uplands, a viewing tower of mud flats where shorebirds and waders feed at low tide, as well as a sand beach on the south side of its peninsula for loafing terns and skimmers. Good for songbird fallouts in migration, this site is also nice for wintering water birds.

- **Anclote Gulf Park** — An extensive fishing pier gives good access to mudflats and open water for wintering ducks, feeding shore and wading birds, as well as flyovers from terns and gulls. In winter, birders scope for bufflehead, common loons and horned grebes out on the Gulf. Like many coastal areas in Pasco County, gray kingbirds are possible in summer.

- **Anclote River Park** — A small park with waterfront worth checking for reddish egrets and black-bellied plovers on flats and in shallows of the Anclote River. Osprey nest nearby, as have great horned owls in past years. This site has a popular boat launch that can get very busy on weekends; come early, or on a weekday. 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Cycling Pasco's Hills and Trails



The hills and trails in Pasco attract cycling enthusiasts from all over Tampa Bay and beyond. Visitors and residents alike enjoy the 42-mile paved Suncoast Trail in Central Pasco and the challenging terrain and small town feel of Eastern Pasco.

Annual Events The Dade City hills also attract race organizers. Major races include The Race for Humanity (www.theraceforhumanity.com) every February, the St. Petersburg Times Bike Tour (www.sptimes.com/biketour) in March and the Hilly Hundred (www.tbfreewheelers.com) every October. The Race for Humanity takes riders through the downtown areas of Dade City and San Antonio, and spectators are welcome. Plus, Pasco is the home to a number of sprint triathlons.

Bike Paths and Trails Spanning three counties as it parallels the Suncoast Parkway, the Suncoast Trail starts in Tampa and goes north through Pasco and up to Brooksville. The trail is accessible in Pasco County at State Road 54, State Road 52, Crews Lake Park and Jay B. Starkey Wilderness Park. Markers along the way recall historical significance, emphasize transitions between ecological communities and identify native species. Based in large part on the Suncoast trail, the Suncoast Parkway has been designated a Scenic Highway. 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Ecotours of Natural Florida

Nature-lovers will enjoy Pasco County's expansive wilderness. A glimpse into everything Pasco offers comes together with a visit to Crystal Springs Preserve. This trip is both educational and adventurous.

Crystal Springs Preserve Pasco County is home to Florida's premier Living laboratory, a fabulous 525 acre environmental education center located on Crystal Springs Preserve. Visitors are encouraged to arrange a tour of the site, take guided nature walks, explore the boardwalks along the Hillsborough River, view Crystal Springs and participate in the educational programs designed for all ages. The pristine wilderness offers amazing opportunities for wildlife viewing and birding. The nature center features native reptiles and amphibians.

Crystal Springs, just south of Zephyrhills, is the largest natural spring system south of Weeki Watchee. The 40 million gallon per day flow from Crystal Springs triples the down stream volume of the Hillsborough River as it wanders through the preserve. Tours require a minimum of 15 people. Programs can be tailored to fit any group's needs, accommodating seniors, families, scouts and school groups of all ages (pre-school through college). 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Travel Back in Time



It's more than a slogan at the Pioneer Florida Museum & Village— it's a reality Nestled on 20 acres of wooded hillside in northeast Pasco County, the **Pioneer Florida Museum & Village** gives tribute to the lives and histories of early pioneer Floridians. Made up of a main building and a walking village, this Dade City museum houses many pioneer treasures.

Inside the main building, visitors can peruse collections of Native American artifacts, letters and war treasures dating back to the Civil War, Roseville pottery and more. Visitors can walk through the medical room and see what visiting the dentist and doctor was like in the old days, or they can marvel at the rare collection of miniature dolls representing the first ladies of Florida. Beginning in 1821 with Mrs. Andrew Jackson, each doll is dressed to represent how the first lady looked on her husband's inauguration night. Other buildings and historical features on the grounds of this unique Florida museum include:

- **Lacoochee School** – a 1930's building which has been restored and furnished in the style of the one-room schools prevalent in pioneer Florida.
- **John Overstreet House** – a two-story farmhouse constructed of native heart pine and built in the 1860's. The house, a typical pioneer era structure, is complete with a dogtrot connecting it to the kitchen and period furnishings.
- **The Trilby Depot** – built in 1896 and once located in Trilby, the third largest rail yard in Florida. Outside the depot sits a 1913 Porter Steam Engine, used by the local Cummer Cypress Company to haul cypress logs to its sawmill in Lacoochee.
- **Enterprise Church** – originally built in 1878 by local residents, the church was moved to the Pioneer Museum in 1977 to be preserved as an example of rural architecture.
- **Jack Bromley's Shoe Repair Shop** – brought from Kansas to Dade City in 1913, cobbler Jack Bromley operated this small shop for many years.

Each year the museum plays host to hundreds of school-age children studying Florida's heritage. The grounds are also used for weddings, picnics, class reunions and other special events.

The **Pioneer Florida Days Festival** every Labor Day weekend attracts crowds of people to the museum every year. Attendees experience early Florida history through Civil War reenactments, children's activities and authentic craft demonstrations. Supported entirely by volunteers and generous donations of historical items and property, the museum has been dedicated to preserving Florida's history since 1961. 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Florida Estates Winery

Florida Estates Winery in Land O' Lakes is Tampa Bay's first premier winery. This secluded winery is surrounded by a canopy of scenic oak trees on a 3,600-acre working plantation four miles west of I-75 on SR 52. This unique winery features festivals twice a month and tasting sessions daily. Florida Estates Winery is open 11 am – 5 pm every day.

The winery opened in 2001 and the vineyard was planted in 2004. Though the grapes are young, Florida Estates Winery staff members are very knowledgeable about Florida wines. Perhaps that is because their sister winery, Eden Vineyards in Fort Myers, is the oldest winery in the state. During tasting sessions, visitors have the opportunity to learn about Florida hybrid wines — a blend made from grapes throughout the state — as well as Merlot, Cabernet Sauvignon, Chardonnay and other well known varietals. Each session lasts 30-40 minutes.

A wine festival and market occurs every other Saturday at the winery. The event features fresh fruits and vegetables, homemade goods and, of course, wine samples and sales. 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Parks in Pasco

Pasco County, the southern-most anchor of Florida's Nature Coast and the tip of Tampa Bay. The County boasts more than 30 visitor friendly parks and preserves. Numerous rivers, trails, shorelines, beaches and picnic spots scattered throughout the area await you.

New Port Richey

At **Jay B. Starkey Wilderness Park**, just eight miles northeast of New Port Richey, you can embark on 13 miles of marked foot trails that wind through Florida's natural landscape. For equestrians, there is a nine-mile horse trail, and pedal pushers will enjoy the three mile paved bike path around the perimeter of the park. For the serious cyclist, an additional 3.5-mile bike trail connects you to the 42-mile paved Suncoast Trail. The park also has campsites and primitive cabins for if you want to "rough it."

At **Sims Park** in downtown New Port Richey you can stroll on the river walk. The river walk parallels the Pithlachascotee River and winds through the four acre park. Bask in the sunshine on one of the many benches edging the river while viewing the river's natural inhabitants – perhaps even catching a glimpse of a gentle manatee.

Dade City

Visit **Withlacoochee River Park**, located in Dade City, for Florida's natural scenery at its finest. There are foot trails to explore, a fishing dock for land-loving anglers, picnic shelters and playgrounds. For those interested in exploring the Withlacoochee River, there is also a canoe launch. The Withlacoochee, whose Native American name "little great water," flows north past Dade City, Lacochee and Withlacoochee State Forest until it empties into an estuary on the Gulf of Mexico. Observe the "natives" of this river habitat such as river otters, alligators, largemouth bass, bream, bluegill and bowfin.

Werner-Boyce Salt Springs State Park, is early in its development. However, areas now accessible to the public in this 3,500-acre park allow visitors to hike and watch for a variety of wildlife including the gopher tortoise, little blue heron, southern bald eagle, Florida black bear and West Indian manatee. In the near future, the park will include canoeing, kayaking, shoreline fishing, biking trails and picnicking along with a 1,000 foot boardwalk to make the park more accessible to visitors.

Flora and Fauna

Pasco's parks offer the perfect opportunity to observe native plant life. Numerous hardwood forests, high pine and flatwoods line county parks and waterways. Nature trails also feature sand pine scrub, freshwater marshes, cypress and prairie ecosystems as well as lakes, rivers and natural spring's habitats.

Not surprisingly, these ecosystems provide a haven for many species of birds and animals. At **Crews Lake Wilderness Park**, visitors can view a variety of resident and migratory bird species from the observation area and mile-long nature trail. Guests can also get an up-close encounter with a colorful cloud of butterflies in the park's butterfly observation area.

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Beach Parks

Head to one of Pasco's three protected beaches where water temperatures average 80° during spring and summer months. With boardwalks, canoe and fishing access, nature trails, picnic areas and playgrounds, these beaches are more than just sand. The 45-acre [Robert K. Rees Memorial Park](#) offers undeveloped beaches edged in seashells while [Hudson Beach](#) has an observation platform perfect for a colorful Florida sunset. [Anclote River Park](#) is also ideal for beach lovers. Just load up the cooler and umbrella for a day of fun.

All Natural

[Key Vista Nature Park](#) is the only park in Pasco County that is dedicated entirely to the environment and the wildlife found there. The 101-acre park along the gulf is made up of easily traveled nature trails and gracious picnic areas.

Travel by Boat

For those with boats, [Anclote Key State Preserve](#) on Anclote Key offers excellent swimming as well as a beautiful, secluded four-mile long beach. Recently, the 118-year-old Anclote Key Lighthouse was restored, and now it shines brightly over the Gulf of Mexico.
